Getting students to speak in the target language



Getting to know you (A)

Pair up with a person you don't know and introduce yourselves to each other.

Ask and exchange information about your self, your work and the languages you teach and speak.

Getting to know you (B)

Pair up with another person you don't know and introduce yourselves to each other.

Ask and exchange information about your self, your work and the languages you teach and speak.

Find a current affairs topic you both know about and exchange your opinions. eg:

Turnbull's 30 poll-in-a-row loss cricket ball tampering saga Facebook security breach Trump's trade war with China

Getting to know you (C)

Find your partner with the same location card as you.

Assume that you are strangers and briefly introduce yourselves.

Ask each other the reason why you have come to this place. Engage in polite chitchat until one person (the tallest) gives an excuse they have to be somewhere else. Farewell each other ie express hope their reasons for coming are achieved.

SIDE BY SIDE Competition

The Competition

Two students of a similar age/year level sit/stand side by side and hold a conversation by asking and answering questions about any topic using familiar language that has recently been explored in class. The conversation must be filmed, which can be done using a device such as an iPad/iPhone and the assistance of a tripod or a third person filming.

Second language learners.

Teachers/school can only submit one entry for each language and year category.

Submission process

Teachers/schools make the submissions via the website and include a scanned copy of a signed Declaration Form for each student appearing in the videos.

Each submission will be judged on:

- Language deployment, ie spoken spontaneously and naturally
- Sustained interaction in the target language
- Fluency Pronunciation and intonation









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Dialogue at an airport (A)

In pairs, read the dialogue aloud as many times as you can during the next 3 minutes. Your aim is memorise your lines so you can perform without looking at the script.



Dialogue at an airport (A)

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Now read the dialogue, becoming less and less reliant on the script. Make sure you stick to the script to ensure you are using the correct forms of present continuous, future tenses and present perfect.

Role play at an airport (B)

If you were previously the visitor, now it is you turn to play the role of the customs official.

Role play at an airport (B)

If you were previously the international visitor, now it is you turn to play the role of the customs official.

Ask to see a disembarked passenger's passport (check the expiry date is valid). Ask about:

- Reasons for visiting Australia
- Last port of departure
- History of visiting Australia
- Length of intended stay
- Accommodation arrangements

Ask them if they have anything to declare, if not, hand them back their passport and wish them well.

Competition Judging Criteria

Each submission (ie. the conversation between the two students) will be judged on:

- Language deployment ie spoken spontaneously and naturally
- Sustained interaction in the target language
- Fluency ie. the ability to maintain a flow, even if it requires use of repair strategies (eg "what I meant was"), survival phrases (eg "sorry could you repeat that") and fillers (eg "um")
- Pronunciation and intonation

Each submission is judged on the language skills of both students and therefore should involve two students of a similar ability.

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
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Task scenarios

- Two strangers sitting on a park bench, greet each other and exchange personal information such as their name, age, where they come from, family and interests.
- Two school students are sitting in the playground, eating their lunch. They exchange information about food and eating eg contents of their lunchbox, likes/dislikes, habits around food, offer to share etc.
- Two strangers sitting on a bus. One lives locally, the other is a visiting tourist from the target language country. They exchange travel information (where they have come from, where they are going, their travel experience and plans for the next few days.
- A journalist interviewing a famous celebrity from the target language country. The celebrity is asked about their childhood, likes/dislikes, influences, fan-base, experiences and aspirations.
- At a doctors surgery, a conversation between doctor and patient. The
 doctor asks the patient about their well-being, eating and fitness habits
 and provides health advice to the patient.
